**Marine Chemist Association Newsletter** 

The Marine Chemist Association held a Board of Directors (BOD) meeting on March 26th in Los Angeles at the Hilton Airport Hotel. This was preceded by the second in-person sectional seminar following the pandemic. Information on the seminar, board meeting and general Marine Chemist activities follow.

At our sectional seminar there were 6 Chemists and 8 board members in attendance along with NFPA representative Larry Russell.

Typically, attendance at sectional seminars averages 20 chemists. While the attendance numbers are increasing the Board believes that the low turnout is due to the large number of chemists who attended the virtual meetings in the past and who do not require an in-person seminar to fulfill their educational requirements. This trend is expected to continue for a few more years until the five-year recertification cycle associated with the virtual seminars ends. At the sectional seminar members in attendance commented on the importance of face-to-face interactions that occur vs the virtual seminars. The seminar had numerous questions and interactions that virtual seminars did not generate.

### Spring 2023 Sectional Seminar

In an effort to continuously improve the sectional seminars the BOD reviewed the presentations at the Chicago sectional seminar. In general, the presentations were well accepted and generated a significant amount of discussion on the theme of Safe for Limited Hot Work. Some minor changes were made to improve the presentations for the spring seminar.

#### Seminar and Meeting Dress Code and Information

The BOD reminds you that we are a professional organization and all members are expected to dress properly during meetings. Business casual dress is required at all seminars and BOD meetings. Additionally, when coming before any Board you are reminded to dress professionally and use appropriate language. This is especially true when going before the MCQB.

The insurance fund reminds every chemist that if appearing before the MCQB for any type of a review you are permitted and encouraged to bring counsel, documentation or any information to make your case. The MCQB also encourages this practice.



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### The Francis Marion Hotel, Charleston, SC.

Last year, to encourage chemists to attend the in-person seminar an incentive program was initiated. With the large number of chemists attending the virtual seminars it is difficult to judge the number of members who will attend an in-person seminar. However, the turnout at San Antonio returned to average and the Board believes this was due to the incentive program. Discussions with the Marine Gas Hazard Control Program/Fund confirmed that the incentive will be available agian in Charleston. The requirements for the incentive follow.

### Seminar Incentive Program Requirements

• The seminar fee (\$400) will be reimbursed/refunded by the MCA. However, you must initially register and pay the seminar fee.



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- Up to \$600 towards room fees will be reimbursed/refunded by the MGHCP through the MCA.
  - Stipulations are as follows.
  - You <u>must</u> be a regular member, certified Marine Chemist and attend the entire seminar (100%) and obtain credit for attending. Note: The 90% attendance waiver will not apply to be eligible for the incentive payment. You <u>must</u> attend the entire seminar to qualify
  - You must stay at the seminar hotel under the MCA room block and your room charge expenses must be at least \$600 (Does not include incidentals and you can be reimbursed a lesser amount for the room cost only).
  - You will be required to pay the fees up front and then fill out an expense voucher with seminar and hotel receipts to be refunded. At the conclusion of the seminar and when credit for attending is obtained, your receipt for the seminar fee and the hotel can be submitted for up to \$1000.00 in reimbursement. Please email copies of the documents to <u>dvraff@comcast.net</u> and a check will be sent out.
  - If you sign up late and are not able to get into the MCA room block you must stay at the same hotel (Francis Marion Hotel) to obtain a refund. Stays at other properties will not be reimbursed for the hotel portion.
  - You must make your own arrangements.

Each guest can make their own reservations by calling (843) 722-0600 or 1(877) 756-2121 by Thursday, June 8, 2023. You must identify yourself as a member of the Marine Chemist Association. All reservations must be guaranteed and accompanied by a first night room deposit or guaranteed with a major credit card.

The cutoff date for room reservations is Thursday June 8, 2023. After this date the MCA room block rate will not be available. If you are considering coming, please make a reservation as we frequently sell out our room block. The MCA has reserved 163 room nights which is our typical number. Please remember that other groups associated with the MCA will also be using the

### **BOD and Correspondence**

#### NFPA 306

Larry Russell reported that as of 3/24/23 no NITMAM's were submitted with a closing date of 3/28/23. It is anticipated that no NITMAMs will be submitted and the standard will go forward as amended. If there are no challenges it is hoped that the printed standard will be sent to all regular members before the annual seminar.

The BOD set up a committee to submit a reformatting of the standard to the 306 committee. This will start once the latest revision of NFPA 306 is complete. Don Raffo will chair the committee.

At the annual seminar a presentation on the changes to NFPA 306 will be held. It is anticipated that this will take place on Wednesday morning. The BOD has invited the MCQB to attend and listen to the presentation. They will not respond to any questions if they attend. Most of Wednesday morning will cover this topic.

### **Marine Chemist Physical Ability to Perform Duties**

NPFA sends the following reminder to Chemists who may not be able to perform their work due to a temporary physical limitation.

The NFPA Marine Field Service wishes to remind all Marine Chemists, the *Rules for the Certification and Recertification of Marine Chemists*, as amended 01 September 2023, *Section II. Qualifications – General, Paragraph A*, requires all Marine Chemists to *"be of an maintain* 



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good character, and physically able to perform the duties of a Marine Chemist". In the event that a Marine Chemist is unable to physically perform his or her duties due to injury or illness; the Marine Chemist should be examined by a licensed physician or licensed physician's and obtain a statement attesting to the Chemist's physical ability to perform the duties of a Marine Chemist. The *General Medical Examination Form* (Form No. CMC-MD-01) can be used for this purpose.

#### **MGHCP** Report

The MCA requested a grant of \$248,000 at the January meeting of the board and it was approved. This funding goes to subsidize the seminars, run the MCA and support BOD meetings. The cost per person of a sectional seminar is about \$850 and an annual seminar is about \$1200. This is dependent on the number of chemists attending the seminars. The current cost of a sectional seminar is \$78.00 and an annual is \$416.00. The balance is paid from the grant.

During 2022, 19,191 electronic certificates and 10,850 paper certificates were issued for a total of 30,041 certificates. This number is significant as the general thought is that 30,000 certificates are needed to financially support the program at the current surcharge rate of \$25.00. While there is no surcharge increase planned in the near future it is important to be aware of this number. NFPA reported a slightly larger number of certificates issued (30,600). This is most likely due to paper certificates purchased in 2021 but issued in 2022 or purchased at the end of 2022 which will be issued in 2023. While the NFPA number is important the total used to compute income is significant as that is where the MCA obtains it funding.

At the start of 2023 the numbers seem to be improving as shown below. Hopefully, the upward trend continues.
